

# Can coin lockers be used

Are coin lockers a good idea in Japan?

Coin lockers are highly convenient if you want to explore a few hours before you head to your next destination! At coin lockers, you can store your luggage like a suitcase or a backpack. You can expect them at major train stations in Japan, and you may also find them at train stations in smaller tourist towns.

What is a coin locker?

Coin lockers are a common sight at train stations, bus terminals, shopping malls, and tourist spots. They come in various sizes, catering to different storage needs, be it your bulky suitcase, your hefty shopping bags, or the jacket you don't need for the rest of the day. It's like having a portable closet at your disposal.

Do you need a large coin locker?

However, the same cannot be said for large coin lockers, those generally used by tourists to store large luggage (those that go into the hold by plane, so to speak). Especially in very busy periods, if you need a large coin locker in a certain place it is good to go very early in the morning because there is a risk that they are all full.

Are coin lockers safe?

Large coin lockers are available, so even large suitcases are safe, but since it is necessary to use the stairs to get to the coin lockers, it may be better to leave excessively heavy luggage elsewhere. In addition to coins, thousand-yen bills and transportation system IC cards except PiTaPa are accepted as payment methods.

Where can I find a coin locker?

There's also a website called Coin Locker Navi that shows maps of the coin lockers' locations in different areas, not only train stations. It also shows the lockers' sizes and prices. The website is in Japanese, but you can use the automatic translation in browsers like Google Chrome, which works pretty well.

Can you use a coin locker on a plane?

There are large coin-operated lockers, so even large suitcases should be fine. However, the aisle in front of the coin lockers is narrow, so be careful when inserting and removing luggage. In addition to coins, transportation system IC cards (except PiTaPa) can be used for payment.

Depending on the size of your baggage, you can choose from small (13" x 16" x 22"), medium (22" x 16" x 22"), and large (44" x 16" x 22") coin-operated lockers. Small coin ...

1. First, prepare a ¥100 coin. In many cases, you can only use ¥100 coins for the coin lockers. Since change machines are often located nearby, if you do not have a ¥100 coin you can first ...
